## Course Objectives:

The course offers a contemporary approach to digital design emphasizing the separation of design and optimization tasks and introducing design methods as currently practiced. The course introduces students to the

widely used hardware description language *Verilog*. The course covers: Boolean algebra, combinational and sequential logic components and design processes, storage elements, timing and timing-related non-idealities (setup/hold constraints, hazards), finite state machines, datapath components (adders, multipliers), RTL design, optimization techniques for combinational and sequential circuits (2-level logic minimization, FSM state encoding, Mealy vs. Moore FSMs), datapath component tradeoffs (slow vs. fast adders).

The students will work with a modern configurable logic design platform (FPGA) and design tools (Xilinx Vivado) for logic simulation, synthesis, and FPGA configuration.
